Talk 3: "The cultural nature of early relationships and development", Presidential symposium by Kai von Klitzing, Nandita Chaudhary and discussion by Campbell Paul that marked the end of the WAIMH conference. Synopsis and discussion lead: Salisha Maharaj



June Speaker

We would like to thank our June speaker **Professor Katherine Bain** who presented her talk "A person's a person, no matter how small": The challenge to prioritize infant mental health in the national health system. Her talk highlighted several challenges that affect progress made towards implementing knowledge about infant mental health in private and public health settings. She identified several areas where advocacy may be expanded and also shared her article published in the South African Journal of Psychology. The talk stimulated a rich discussion and there was a suggestion that we should revisit the of ways that awareness about infant mental health may be expanded at a future meeting. Members who were unable to attend, but who would like to view a recording of the talk are welcome to email us, and we will send you the download link.

July highlight

This month, we would like to highlight **The Parent Centre's Mandela Day** initiative to support a number of new mothers in the Parent Infant Programme who are in dire situations and in urgent need of basic supplies, such as food, nappies and clothing for their babies. We would like to encourage our members to joint them by donating 67 items or giving R67 towards baby items.



The main items needed:

- Cloth Nappies
- Baby Grows: 0-3mths, 3-6mths, 6-12mths
- Socks, Beanies and gloves
- Warm blankets

- Nutritional Baby Cereal/food
- Formula
- Face clothes
- Wipes

They also launched a new drive to collect 'New Mom Boxes' (similar to Santa Shoeboxes), but for new moms in need which they will distribute within the vulnerable communities. Each donated box should have the following (approx cost of R350) if you would prefer to donate towards a box instead:

- 3 x cloth nappies
- Baby grows, a beanie, socks, gloves
- A pack of wipes
- A face cloth
- Baby cereal
- A warm blanket

All Donations or Complete 'New Mom' boxes can be dropped off at The Parent Centre for distribution within their programmes and communities.
