We have the pleasure of welcoming **Dr Sibongile Mpongwana-Ncetani** as our October speaker on the topic **"Experiences of Xhosa women providing Kangaroo Mother Care (KMC) in a tertiary hospital in the Western Cape, South Africa"**. She will be focussing on the burden of preterm births in low and middle income countries, and discuss KMC (Kangaroo mother care) as the strategy adopted by the WHO to

Research promote the advantages of KMC, but it is also known that cultural beliefs can be barriers to the uptake of this preterm infant care method. Her study focused on women who are Xhosa speaking, seeking to understand their experiences of this intervention and if they found it useful. Dr Mpongwana-Ncetani will explore the four themes that emerged from the study and discuss the recommendations that followed from her research.

Dr Sibongile Mpongwana-Ncetani is a fourth-year psychiatry registrar at Stellenbosch University. She feels passionate and called to inspire change and plant seeds of hope for the flourishing of the human soul.
