She will describe an ongoing case of a mother and baby that has been seen at Ububele since 2018. The case in itself is one

characterised by trauma, domestic violence and much complexity. The case will also allow for a window into the 'basket' of services that is provided by Ububele which consists of various Infant Mental health interventions offered in various settings within Alexandra - from NBO (Newborn Behavioral Observations) at clinics and hospitals to home visits and play groups.

We hope to see you all take up this rare opportunity of hearing Katharine speak here in Cape Town.

- Rebecca Spencer, Ph.D, director of the UMASS, Amherst Sleep Monitoring Lab who has studied the importance of naps for a baby's learning
- Michael Georgieff, M.D., executive vice chair and professor of the Department of Pediatrics at the University of Minnesota, who has linked iron and other micronutrients to babies' ability to form memories
- Ruth Feldman, Ph.D., professor of developmental social neuroscience at the Interdisciplinary Center (IDC) in Herzliya, Israel), who discovered that the surge in oxytocin, the bonding hormone, that occurs in new mothers, can also take place in men
- Susan Lynch, Ph.D., professor of medicine at the University of California, San
 Francisco, who found that babies living with dogs and cats are better protected
 from developing asthma and allergies
- Ed Tronick, Ph.D on his work on the Still Face experiment and the impact of sensitive and attuned caregiving on attachment
